Wellbeing Newsletter Article

Our students in St Mary Magdalene's have begun the term by participating in classroom morning circles. These circles promote a greater level of positivity and relationship in the morning with the aim to increase engagement in class and sense of wellbeing.

- The circles begin with greeting each other
- · discussing our class values and expectations to promote a safe environment
- sharing any important announcements
- · Positive Primer- movement game, activity, music or video to elicit happiness
- What Went Well discussing small and big moments of what has been good about our morning/ day/ week/ develops students and staff's sense of gratitude and mindfulness

We ask parents and caregivers to help support your children and their teachers by also asking the children 'what went well?' at the end of the day. Children can sometimes fall into the trap of talking about the things that went wrong during the day and not remember or recognise the moments that were positive! The smaller the moment the better! It may be a hug from a parent, toast was cooked perfectly, the cuddle with a pet, favourite song came on the radio – there is no wrong answer. By doing this we are all developing the children's ability to look for moments of beauty in life and awareness of what is around them. This increases resilience for when things don't go planned because they will continue to look for the good around them instead.



What is the Liturgical Year?

A Liturgical Year shows the cycle of seasons in the Catholic Church. The Church year consists of six liturgical seasons: Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time after Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time after Pentecost. In each newsletter we aim to highlight different events in the Liturgical Calendar that we might be celebrating in our school. An important liturgical season that comes up in our liturgical calendar during term 1 is Lent and Easter.

Each term, we gather in a variety of ways as a school to engage in liturgical celebrations of prayer, liturgy and the celebration of Mass. Sometimes we gather as a whole school and other times our classes join in teams to lead these celebrations. We invite you to join us in our celebrations and will advertise these to you in advance.



Growing in Mercy

This year, classes will be engaging with the book "One Child" by Christopher Cheng. This book focusses on the difference one child can make to our world through an environmental lens. Through the lens of 'Growing in Mercy' we hope to have the students begin to think about what difference they can make to our world, our school, our classrooms, and homes to make it a better place for all.

SHROVE TUESDAY, ASH WEDNESDAY & LENT

In Week 6 this term, we enter a new liturgical season in the Catholic Church, the season of Lent. This season lasts for forty days and forty nights. Our students recognise the change in prayer cloth colour on our classroom prayer tables as it changes from green to purple.

Shrove Tuesday

This day is celebrated by people around the world in different ways. Some refer to it as Pancake Day, Mardi Gras or Carnevale. In preparation for Lent, Catholics would use up foods which they were not permitted to consume during Lent. This included eggs, fat and rich foods. This year, we will celebrate Shrove Tuesday with sharing pancakes with staff and students. More information will be sent to families regarding this in the coming weeks.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday begins the Season of Lent. The marking of ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday is a reminder for us all to walk with Jesus during the season of Lent, to say sorry for the times we have hurt others and aim to become more loving as we work to put others' needs before our own. It is a special time when we stop and think about how we can play our part in God's hope for a world that is fair, just and peaceful. Our next Whole School Liturgy is our **Ash Wednesday** celebration with the distribution of the ashes. This will be held on **Wednesday 5th of March**, at **2:15pm**, in **Yarning Place**.

Learning Kindness

At our school, kindness isn't just something we talk about-it's something we practice. Recently, Mr. Richard and Mr. Morgado led an activity that encouraged students to spread joy in a simple way.

Armed with paint pens and creativity, groups of students decorated small rocks with affirming words like joy, kindness, love, and justice. The idea behind the project was simple: to create something positive and send it out into the world with no expectation of return—just a small act of selfless kindness to make the school a better place. Once the rocks were decorated, students placed them in special spots around the school—hidden in gardens, nestled near walkways, or tucked into quiet corners—waiting to be discovered by others. Each rock now serves as a little reminder that kindness is everywhere, sometimes in the places you least expect.

Through this activity, students learned that kindness doesn't always need recognition. Sometimes, the best acts of goodwill are the ones done purely for the sake of making someone's day a little brighter.

So, keep an eye out! You never know when you might find a small, hand-painted rock carrying a message meant just for you.

Because kindness, no matter how small, has the power to ripple outward and make a difference.
